Leave No Trace is a set of principles that empower people visiting the outdoors to leave nature as unchanged by our presence as possible.

It's a way of protecting the natural world that can be applied anywhere—when you visit national parks or your community's natural spaces.

01 PLAN AHEAD AND PREPARE

- Know the regulations and special concerns for the area you'll visit.
- · Prepare for extreme weather, hazards, and emergencies.
- · Schedule your trip to avoid times of high use.
- Visit in small groups when possible. Consider splitting larger groups into smaller groups.
- · Repackage food to minimize waste.
- Use a map and compass to eliminate the use of marking paint, rock cairns or flagging.

12 TRAVEL AND CAMP ON DURABLE SURFACES

- Durable surfaces include established traits and campsites, rock, gravel, dry grasses or snow.
- Protect riparian areas by camping at least 200 feet from takes and streams.
- Good campsites are found, not made. Altering a site is not necessary.
- In popular areas:
 - · Concentrate use on existing trails and campsites.
 - Walk single file in the middle of the trail, even when wet or muddy.
 - Keep campsites small. Focus activity in areas where vegetation is absent.
- · In pristine areas:
 - · Disperse use to prevent the creation of campsites and trails.
 - · Avoid places where impacts are just beginning.

03 DISPOSE OF WASTE PROPERLY

- Pack it in, pack it out. Inspect your campsite and rest areas for trash or spilled foods. Pack out all trash, leftover food and litter.
- Deposit solid human waste in catholes dug 6 to 8 inches deep, at least 200 feet from water, camp and traits. Cover and disguise the cathole when finished.
- · Pack out toilet paper and hygiene products.
- To wash yourself or your dishes, carry water 200 feet away from streams or lakes and use small amounts of biodegradable soap. Scatter strained dishwater.

WHAT YOU

- Preserve the past: examine, but do not touch cultural or historic structures and artifacts.
- Leave rocks, plants and other natural objects as you find them.
- Avoid introducing or transporting non-native species.
- · Do not build structures, furniture, or dig trenches.

05 MINIMIZE CAMPFIRE IMPACTS

- Campfires can cause lasting impacts to the environment.
 Use a lightweight stove for cooking and enjoy a candle lantern for light.
- Where fires are permitted, use established fire rings, fire pans, or mound fires.
- Keep fires small. Only use sticks from the ground that can be broken by hand.
- Burn all wood and coals to ash, put out campfires completely, then scatter cool ashes.

06 RESPECT

- Observe wildlife from a distance. Do not follow or approach them.
- Never feed animals. Feeding wildlife damages their health, afters natural behaviors, and exposes them to predators and other dangers.
- Protect wildlife and your food by storing rations and trash securely.
- Control pets at all times, or leave them at home.
- Avoid wildlife during sensitive times: mating, nesting, raising young, or winter.

P BE CONSIDERATE OF OTHER VISITORS

- Respect other visitors and protect the quality of their experience.
- Be courteous. Yield to other users on the trail.
- Step to the downhill side of the trail when encountering pack stock.
- · Take breaks and camp away from trails and other visitors.
- · Let nature's sounds prevail. Avoid loud voices and noises.
